The Freedom of a Christian

The first Saturday of July we will celebrate Independence Day, the national holiday that links our country's story inextricably to the idea of freedom. It a beautiful and inspiring element of our national identity – the idea that our country exists in order to ensure freedom not just for a group of ruling elites, but for all people, in all of their diversity. While we have never entirely lived up to this ideal (and I doubt any complex society could) it is, at least, a positive goal to reach for.

But what does freedom mean for a Christian? Whatever our national and cultural identities, our most fundamental identity is that we are children of God, baptized into the promise and practice of faith. So what does our faith teach us about freedom? And how can that teaching shape the way that we engage the American cultural ideal of freedom.

One of Martin Luther's most famous teachings comes from his treatise on The Freedom of a Christian. In that work he explains the paradox of the Christian relationship to freedom:

"A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all."

This paradox celebrates the freedom that we find in our faith: we are "perfectly free... subject to none." Our most essential identity is found in Christ, so no other human being or human institution can demand our absolute allegiance. BUT that freedom does not exist for us to exploit. We are not just "freed from" we are simultaneously "freed for." We are freed to serve. To serve our neighbor, to serve the stranger, even to serve our enemy because truly loving our enemies requires that we seek to ensure that their true needs are met. We are freed from fear, and from sin, and from death, and from the claims of all who would seek to control or enslave us. But that freedom is not just for our own good. We are always called to use our freedom for the good of others.

Plans for Re-Gathering

While no decisions have been made yet regarding transitioning back to in-person worship at Abiding Peace, here are a few things to keep in mind as we plan:

We are not planning for a re-opening. The church has stayed open and active this whole time. The Church is the people, not the building. What we are planning for is a re-gathering. This planning recognizes the value and the energy that we get from being together, while also affirming our identity as the church, whether we are together or not.

Our starting point is safety. Jesus commands his followers very clearly – the center of "all the law and the prophets" is *love of God and love of neighbor*. Love of God is not dependent on any particular form of worship; it's a matter of our commitment and trust. Love of neighbor - In the context of a deadly pandemic – is dependent on taking all necessary steps to protect our neighbors from harm. This means that the timing for our return to in-person worship will be determined by guidance about what is safe, rather than by calendars, and that re-gathering will look different than what we are used to with in-person worship. It also means that we will continue to offer remote livestreaming worship for those who cannot safely gather in the sanctuary.

Our means is creativity. We do not believe that changes in the ways that we worship need to be an experience of deprivation or loss. We have so many diverse resources to help us to worship in new and engaging ways. So, while worship will be different in many ways, we hope and trust that it can connect us to God and each other in exciting ways. The planning team welcomes any ideas from the congregation for how to adapt our worship practices in creative, lifegiving ways. And if you have a creative skill that you would like to offer for this planning, please let us know!

Our goal is worship. When we participate in worship, we bring all of ourselves to the experience. This means that we are present with all of our own individual preferences for how we like to worship. But worship should not be about satisfying these preferences. Worship is about our desire to draw close to God, to praise God's goodness and mercy, and to be transformed and empowered by that experience. We are certainly involved in worship, but we are not at the center. As we adjust our practices to be safe and to utilize creative new ideas, the center of our planning and our practice will always be the goal of helping the congregation to give glory to God, and to be shaped by that experience.

It is a time to celebrate! We can thank God that our congregation's financial stewardship is looking positive – literally. As of the end of May we have a \$483 surplus, rather than a shortage as has been the case for at least as long as I can remember. In fact, this is after we have overcome a deficit of thousands of dollars with which we started out 2020. Why?

One factor is that our Administrator, Christine Strobel, offered to reduce her hours as she took on a separate full-time job. Council agreed to give this a trial, and to date it has worked well. With only minor scheduling accommodations, the budget needed after January for this staff position has been reduced 58%. In addition, through good stewardship in handling our finances, George Pawlo has saved us money by our converting the boiler from oil to heat and by finding savings in our insurance expenses.

Of greatest significance, however, is your own continued faithful stewardship, which not only makes possible the ministry of Abiding Peace but also confirms your faith and trust in God even during these COVID times. Whether your income is up or down, your regular giving of a portion of that income demonstrates through your life and values the primacy of your faith.

That is why your support of Abiding Peace continues at a time when we are literally not passing the plate! Your mailing in your offering, giving automatically through your bank, and now, thanks to Nick Senior, giving through Venmo all remind us that our church community continues and thrives even when we cannot gather in person. Thanks be to God!
