Last month I shared a three-part description of *missional leader-ship* drawn from the ELCA candidacy process: missional leaders (and congregations) are "**prepared** for ministry in light of **God's mission** for *the* **sake of the world**." This description offers a challenge to our community to think carefully about the goal underlying all of the many things we spend our time and resources doing. In other words, how does our work connect to our mission? In my February article I reflected on the *preparation* part of this understanding. This month, I want to talk about the *ministry* part.

In church-speak, "ministry" can be a catch-all phrase for any and all activities of the church. We have fellowship ministries, music ministries, dance ministries, social ministries, and education ministries. All of these things are wonderful and genuine areas of ministry, but the habits of language can make the word ministry sound like a synonym for "department," and this can give the impression that church is all about programs. In contrast, the New Testament word for ministry is *diakonia*. Diakonia also means service. It is not about organizational functioning or program areas, it is about reaching toward needs.

What is more, missional ministry remembers that our work, our service, gets its meaning from God's mission. Church is more than a community of like-minded people; it is a community formed by God to share together in God's work. As a missional church, everything we do should flow from and serve our understanding of how we are called to be God's hands, feet, voices, and heart in the world. Programs are all well and good, but that's not what church is about. We are about mission and ministry.

#### I've Always Wanted to Know...

We always learn more when we are interested in the topics we are learning about. That's why members at Abiding Peace are encouraged to help with the planning of our adult education offerings. This year, we are taking another

step and asking you to nominate specific topics for three of our education series. Check out the kinds of studies we are planning to do, then make your nominations on the lists posted on the sign-up board outside the church office:

- Hymns (April/May) Is there a classic hymn that has always made you question, "I wonder what the back story is"? Check out the list of 28 (mostly) common hymns on the sign-up board and see if it is listed. If it is, cast your "vote" and we can learn about it. If it's not, see if any others catch your eye. We will be doing a few adult forum sessions using the resource Hymns To Sing Before You Die to learn about the history of the hymns we love to sing.
- "Problem" Texts (April) You can love the Bible and also find parts of it confusing, frustrating, or down-right alarming! When we have those reactions to something we read in scripture, we might be tempted to turn away, but those reactions can be a great invitation to lean in. The Bible is not an instruction manual that you can skim and understand without much thought. We have to struggle and question and explore its complexities. So, what stories or passages do you want to explore?
- Parables (May/September) We had a great time studying a number of the parables of Jesus last year, but there are so many we did not get to study. Check out the list posted on the sign-up board or nominate another that you think might be interesting. We will be diving into these fascinating stories for our mid-week study before and after the Summer break.

#### **Assistants Needed**

Adding an additional communion assistant has helped the serving of Holy Communion run smoothly but it also means that another person is required. Please consider volunteering for this simple duty. There is no formal reading required. The communion assistant simply helps serve the wine, either with the pouring chalice or common cup. The only speaking required is the simple message "The blood of Christ shed for you".

# Our Boiler and Our Stewardship

Thanks to you, fellow members and friends of Abiding Peace, our new boiler is nearly paid for. And it hasn't even completed its first win-

ter of use

The increasing flames of our campaign poster show us meeting this sudden, serious, significant monetary need. We are now nearing our \$7,500 goal! Together with \$6,000 set aside earlier for unexpected needs, we have made the final boiler payment.

This is a great example of stewardship, both as a congregation and as individuals.

Our Council has been a good steward of the resources of our congregation by setting the goal of funding this need without indebtedness. Because we didn't need to finance it over time (and thanks to George's negotiating), we received a \$1,500 discount. That's good stewardship!

But even more, as individuals, we have stepped up to achieve this goal with generosity and love. How else to explain such giving? Can you think of anything less exciting than the replacement of a fuel oil furnace? It's just maintenance. It had to be done somehow. We know we weren't moved by the excitement of what would result from a successful campaign.

Rather, it affirms Vicar Serena's words in last month's newsletter, that stewardship is about "knowing that we are called to be part of God's work in the world, and finding joy in that opportunity." Even when it means giving for something as mundane as replacing a broken-down appliance. That was a God-given opportunity, and an occasion for joy!

#### **Spring Is About To Be Sprung**

Days are getting longer, birds are singing, which means it's time to start thinking about our garden. We had a very successful growing season last year and the residents at Mount Olive Manor were so grateful for the 220 lbs. of vegetables we were able to donate. Our plan is to exceed that amount this year!

How will we do that? We will be extending our garden in the spot volunteers cleared last year which should add at least 200 square feet of growing space. We'll also be doing a lot of succession planting, starting with cooler weather varieties in late March/early April, to keep a steady supply of veggies coming in.

**How can you help?** Volunteers are always welcome for planting, weeding and watering the vegetable garden as well as our seasonal ornamental plantings. We'll also need help with construction of the new garden. No previous gardening experience needed! We have a lot of seasoned gardeners to offer guidance. Once veggies are ready to harvest, we'll need help picking, bagging and dropping off to Mount Olive Manor.

**Don't want to get your hands dirty?** Contribute to our compost pile (located to the right of our garden behind the church). You'll reduce what goes into landfills, naturally fertilize the garden and our worms will thank you.

#### OK to compost:

- Raw veggie scraps
- ◆ Coffee grounds
- ◆ Eggshells
- Shredded newspaper black print only
- Grass clippings not treated with any type of weed and feed or pesticides
- Shredded leaves
- Pet fur
- Horse and cow manure if you have access to it. Please confirm with owners that their animals are not given antibiotics and graze on grass not treated with pesticides or weed killer.

# The Journey Down by Vicar Serena (shared by Vicar Serena at the Ecumenical Ash Wednesday Service)

Our language casts a not-so-subtle shadow on the things **below**:

words communicate inferiority – base, low, depressed, beneath.

To *lower* our standards is to degrade ourselves; and we look *down* on those who do not take the higher road.

The *underworld* is said to be the haunt of demons, and the damned, a hell where all the good and living fear to tread.

Patterns of **word** and **symbol** cause us to **fear the depths**, the deep, dark places of the earth, or sea... or soul.

So, we **resist** the downward path,

we see descent as loss, of status, place, esteem, or vista.

We are afraid of sliding on the slope, losing control, careening down, a one-way road that leads to our destruction, the fateful wrong direction, a final... *fall*.

Instead, we're seeking always to *ascend*.

To *rise* above

detractors, circumstances, or the competition,

to climb the ladder, scale to the heights, to be always, only at the top, to be the ones looked up to, rising above all who are trapped below our penthouse view. Continued from page 8—The Journey Down

Or else, we long to climb the mountaintop.

To reach the heights of **self-actualization**, and, thus, **transcend** the earthly cares and sorrows that so often make a **trap** of life lived in the shadowlands.

We want our souls to rise Like incense in a heavenly curl And find release from bodily weight That drags... us... down.

Down to the depths, where we fear being **broken**.

I know this fear and longing – both – that pull us - always - UP.

But I would like to make a case for the journey DOWN.

To travel toward the depths must **not** always be an uncontrolled and tumbling plunge.

There is a **stronger** way to walk the downward road, a balanced tread that knows the truth of gravity's strong pull, and **leverages** it to help in the descent, while holding to a tight-held core of **trust** in deepest bedrock and the slow, deliberate step.

This careful, measured movement takes the time to understand the *lessons in each footfall*.

The journey down gives chance to travel **through** –
to mine the layers of experience and pain
that built the canyon walls;
to **comprehend** the many-hued **foundations** that support the giddy heights,
hiding shadowed beauty below the elevated surface.

The air is *richer* in the depths, heavy with the *promise* of the canyon-carving waters. The cool, clean mist offering a rest of *slow, deep breaths*, restoring spirit in the gentle stillness *free of striving*.

And eyes that grow accustomed to the dimmer light

can see the details of life in the *immediate* and *near*, with sight no longer pulled away by distant vista, the overwhelming sky diminished to a hot, bright sliver far away above the canyon walls.

This *down-drawn vision* is limited, but it is *real*, and trains the eyes in noticing what's just beneath our feet:

#### A solid foundation. A place to be and know yourself,

in the bare truth that is revealed only at **rock bottom**, all pretense stripped away by the honesty of sitting on the ground, in the dirt, and knowing you are **dust**, and to dust you will **return**.

It is into the depths that **God** came down,

**Emptying** God's glory into our frail and lowly human flesh. and making it **beloved**, despite... in fact because, God suffered death, descending to the deepest pit of hell.

To **rise** again

The journey down is **not about the destination** in the end.

It is about the *letting go*,

not of our strength, our core of self, but of the need to be above.

It is about the wisdom learned by walking **toward** that which we have been taught to **fear**, and finding there a **freedom from performance**.

And learning, too, that such honesty is love,

and this true *love*, when braided together with *faith* and *hope*, can become the rope to which we hold

as we begin, again, to *climb*.
