Ideas for Rally Day Service Project Needed!

July is here, and hopefully we are all making the most of the sun and fun of Summer. But we know that September and Rally Day will be here before we know it, and that means another chance for our congregation to do the work of reaching out to our community's needs

God's Work, Our Hands Sunday will be held on September 8 this year. This is an effort of ELCA churches across the country to get practical about the gospel's call to be about the work of doing God's Kingdom work here and now. So, if you have any ideas for a good community project for God's Work, Our Hands Sunday – drop a note to Pastor Serena. Let's be part of making sure our community knows that "whoever you are, and wherever you are on your journey of faith, you are most welcome here to receive God's goodness, mercy, and love... through our hands."





We like to say church is a verb, because the church is the people and the work that we do together. While this is true, the church building (noun) is an important tool in doing that work.

On June 19, Joe gave a great, little "lesson" at the end of worship about our *Holy, NOT Holey* roof campaign. We informed the congregation about the deteriorating condition of the roof over the sanctuary and the anticipated cost of approximately \$15,000 needed to rectify the problems. We also mentioned that at the present time the church does not have the funds to accomplish this, and we are asking the community to come together to help. These necessary repairs will protect the space for all of our members to come and celebrate God's grace and mercy, and we would appreciate your support for this project benefiting our church community.

With your support, we can replace the roof over the sanctuary so that the only holy water will be in the font. We are asking the members and friends of Abiding Peace to contribute to this effort, according to your ability. We understand that financial situations vary, so the campaign will run from July to December to give people time to budget, as they are able. By knowing that people will be making future contributions, we can borrow money from other areas in the church budget so that we can fix the roof before the next winter. We need to make this happen sooner than later. Together, we can reach our goal of \$15,000 and fix our "holey" roof.

On behalf of our church community at Abiding Peace, we would like to thank you in advance for your support. Your contribution will ensure that we have a place to gather and celebrate our good God and to share our lives. Thanks again for all your support of our church community and for helping to ensure the future of our place of worship and ministry.

Spiritual Life Inventory, Part 3 Personal Spiritual Practices

The results from the Spiritual Life Inventory (SLI) survey – which our church participated in last November – are so rich that we are taking our time to explore them all. While there is much to celebrate in the vitality of our congregation's faith and commitment, the most useful insights are to be found in the areas where we are struggling. This feedback is an important tool to help us recognize where there are unmet needs, or hidden concerns, that could benefit from some attention.

In June's article on the SLI, we looked at the indications that our congregation struggles to know how to talk about our faith with others, or to recognize for ourselves the ways that God is active and present in our daily lives. That challenge potentially connects with a second challenge (which is this month's focus): the need for more guidance in cultivating personal spiritual practices. While 100% of the respondents said they come to church to connect with God, that's not necessarily translating into the Monday-Saturday week. Only 58% said their spiritual growth is rapid or steady, and 28% said they want to grow spiritually, but they feel stalled. As the pastor of this church, my response to that 28% is to ask "how can we help?" More than a quarter of our congregation is not getting what they need to grow the way that they want to, so we need to innovate! We need to find ways to help our members, all of our members, experience God's active, growing presence in their lives.

The SLI offers some insights that can help to get us started. It asked questions about a variety of spiritual practices, which revealed that both *prayer* and *family relationships* are a primary source of spiritual growth for most people in the church. But other practices are being practiced less often, things like *reading the Bible* on our own, having *spiritual conversations* with family or close friends, or taking action to address problems in our world through *advocacy or service*. There are a wealth of spiritual practices out there, things that other faithful people have practiced and found to be sources of growth and connection to God. The challenge for our church is to find ways to facilitate access to these practices, so that our members can find the practices that nourish their lives and faith.

Continued—Personal Spiritual Practices

Our Mutual Ministry team has been ruminating on this question for the past several months, and we have begun to have exciting conversations about the ways that we connect to God in our daily lives. We are five unique people, so different practices appeal to different members of the team. Our hope is to share our learning and exploration with the rest of the church as well. That will start with a regular column in the monthly newsletter, exploring a different spiritual practice each month. Then, in December, Abiding Peace will hold our first **Advent Retreat** on the first Sunday of Advent. We will gather after worship and offer hands-on training, exploration, and resources to help our community engage with the exciting call to cultivate new spiritual practices into our daily lives.

Get Ready for the Summer Book Club!


It's not to late to participate in the **Summer Book Club!** If you did not sign-up for the group order, you can still order the book on <u>Amazon</u> (or from your favorite local book store).

This year, the education planning committee selected *Can I Get A Witness?* by Brian Blount. The book is a carefully researched – but also readable – exploration of the book of Revelation, which unpacks this often mis-understood book by recognizing the importance of context, both the original author's and our own, and be *revealing* (*see what I did there?*) the way that the Christian call to witness is an ethic for response to struggle and suffering.

Why this book? Good Question:

- Revelation can be one of the most intimidating and confusing books in the Bible – this study will help us to understand and connect to it in a new way!
- Reading the Bible through a certain culture, especially if it's not our own, helps us to understand the role that we play in interpretation.
- This book offers us the chance to find the relevance of Revelation in our own lives.

The first session of the Book Club (focusing on the Introduction and chapters 1-2) will be Wednesday, July 17, so get reading! Can't wait to talk about what we all get out of it!



Cow Challenge

Believe it or not, the most exciting thing about the Bishop's Cow Challenge was NOT that Pastor Serena dressed up in a cow suit and mooooo-ed her way into our congregational proclamation of the Pentecost story. Even more exciting is the difference this challenge made to giving for World Hunger!

In May of 2018, Bishop Tracie Bartholomew challenged each congregation in NJ to raise money for ELCA World Hunger. The numbers are in and these are the results:

- 130 Congregations out of 160 participated.
- Out of the 130 congregations, 33 are new congregations that have not made a gift in the past 5 years to World Hunger.
- Out of these 33, 23 have met or exceeded the \$500 dollar challenge, with an offer from an anonymous donor to match their gifts. This amounts to \$11,500 from the donor!
- Over half of our congregations (88) who have supported World Hunger in the past, increased their giving.
- All together, that means that the NJ Synod has double our giving to World Hunger. \$362,000 of actual dollars has been received over the last 12 months, and there is still more money coming in!

This effort is a witness to what we can do when we work together and respond to Christ's call to reach out to our neighbors in need. Thank you for your part in this witness of generosity!
