### **Honoring God by Celebrating Diversity**

I want to start by saying "thank you" to the loving community of Abiding Peace. I'm sure most of you were not expecting our congregation to jump into a discussion about gender identity to start off the new year. But the way you have responded to the news about my child's non-binary identity — with love, and the desire to understand, and holy curiosity — has affirmed what I hoped would happen in our congregation. We trust each other, and we do the hard work of showing up and seeking wisdom together. That's all I can ask of you, and I am both proud and grateful to be the pastor of this community.

With all that being said, I do not expect this learning to be easy or automatic. Some really good and faithful questions have been asked, and I'm sure there will be more. I welcome the chance to explore and seek God's guidance together. One question that I was asked just this week by an old childhood friend is one that comes up often in Christian discussion of trans identities: "We know God doesn't make mistakes, so how can he support trans identities? Isn't that saying that God made a mistake with their bodies?"

It's an important question, because it goes to the heart of what we believe about God's sovereignty and also what we believe about trans and non-binary people. My answer is that I DON'T think God does makes mistakes. I don't think my child's gender identity, or the gender identities of other trans and non-binary people are mistakes. They weren't born in the "wrong" bodies. They were born with diverse genders that don't fit into the limited "male" and "female" categories of our culture. They open our eyes to the beautiful diversity of God's creation.

ELCA pastor and trans man Asher O'Callaghan has described this understanding of God's creative diversity in a beautiful way. He writes:

"In the beginning, God created day and night. But have you ever seen a sunset!?!? Well trans and nonbinary people are kind of like that. Gorgeous. Full of a hundred shades of color you can't see in plain daylight or during the night. In the beginning God created land and sea. But have you ever seen a beach?!?! Well trans and non-binary people are kind of like that. Beautiful. A balanced oasis that's not quite like the ocean, nor quite like the land. In the beginning God created birds of the air and fish of the sea. But have you ever seen a flying fish, or a duck or a puffin that swims and flies, spending lots of time in the water and on the land!?!? Well trans and non-binary people are kind of like that. Full of life. A creative combination of characteristics that blows people's minds. In the beginning God also created male and female, in God's own image, God created them. So, in the same way that God created realities in between, outside of, and beyond night and day, land and sea, or fish and birds, so God also created people with genders beyond male and female. Trans and non-binary and agender and intersex, God created us. All different sorts of people for all different sorts of relationships. Created from love to love and be loved. In God's image we live."

It's natural to feel afraid of affirming trans and nonbinaries genders if we think that means saying that God messed up. But what if, instead, if means giving God glory for the full spectrum of God's creative vision? What if the actual challenge to God's sovereignty is to limit God's creative power to just the two genders that our culture is used to recognizing? What if we honor God when we celebrate the beauty and uniqueness of identities all along the gender spectrum?

These are the questions that I want to bring to our community as we learn together. You are welcome to bring your questions too. Questions can be holy things. They can draw us closer to God and to each other as we lean in, seeking wisdom, understanding, and love.

[Of course, answers can be holy too – and can give us some anchor points when we feel confused. So, if you did not get a chance to hear Jamie Bruesehoff's presentation on Jan. 12, I have an audio recording. Let me know if you would like a copy.

"Don't tell me where your priorities are. Show me where you spend your money and I'll tell you what they are." So wrote James Frick. Jesus was even more direct: "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Jesus spoke a lot about money because what we do with it has a lot to do with our spiritual lives, our faith, and our priorities.

To reflect upon our priorities, we can look at how we spend money – within our personal households and also within our congregation. Below is a look at the categories of spending within Abiding Peace's budget of this past year.

3.5% of our spending went to benevolence, also known as mission support. These are funds that we give to the regional (NJ Synod) and national (ELCA) expressions of our church. Just as we as members give in appreciation and thankfulness to God through our congregation, so our congregation gives beyond itself for the wider church.

53% went to our staff, showing a high priority on ministry through people: a pastor to shepherd us in our individual and collective ministries, a musician to lead us in music to better increase our joy and worship of God, and an administrator to help us carry out the everyday tasks of our congregation's ministry.

20% went to pay our mortgage. Our congregation's life is blessed by those who have built and paid toward our facilities in the past, and our current payments will bless those who come after us at Abiding Peace.

20% went towards routine cleaning and maintenance of our property, the utilities needed to keep them in operation, and insurance to help us continue our ministry here in a world of risk. It's not a very exciting category, but stewardship means faithfully caring for what God has blessed us with.

4.4% went to various ministry expenses, especially for worship and music, attendance at our NJ Synod convention, and office supplies.

In addition to our budgeted items, we spent money on other things, mostly according to what was specifically given for those things, including ELCA World Hunger and flowers/decorations. Also in 2019 members gave special gifts to provide a new (holy rather than holey!) roof over our sanctuary. If our budget had been expanded to include the roof fund, it would have been 9.2 % of our budget.

Our congregation's spending is an expression of our giving – to our ministry, our wider church, our community and world. And our personal giving is an expression of our priorities and values as well. May God bless us as we go forward, both as individuals and as a congregation, in our giving and our spending.

### SOMEWHAT OFFICIAL RULES FOR A CHILI COOK-OFF

#### 1) SELECTION OF THE JUDGES

Proper judges for any Chili Cook-off should have three principal values:

- a) A complete lack of values or principles, such as integrity. No one with integrity would even attend a Chili Cook-off, let alone judge one. Sales ability counts for extra points if you can sell Spam as real food.

Afterglow, animals and small children stand next to you outside 'cause you're very warm, all over. Other "after—" words that could be applied include afterlife, aftertaste, and aftermath.
