"Priesthood of all Believers." That's one of those super churchyphrases that you might have heard, but you also might not really understand what it means. Historically it just means *we are all equal before God*. Martin Luther rejected the idea that priests had some sort of higher spiritual status than the people they served, so he said "everyone's a priest! All believers have priestly status." That is absolutely true and wonderful. God hears all prayers equally, and no one gets special treatment.

In the 500 years since the Reformation, the phrase has developed another meaning which is true and wonderful as well: the idea that *all believers do the work of ministry*. In the Lutheran church, we don't attend worship as though it was a performance put on by professionals – we all share in the liturgy (which means "work of the people"). And we share in the other work of the church as well: the work of serving community needs, the work of studying the Bible and learning together, the work of bringing food for soup suppers; the work of caring for those who are sick in our congregation, the work of getting the boiler fixed. The church is not a business that hires professionals to produce its products. The church is the people of God coming together to do God's work in the world.

That's why our theme for this year's Spring Time & Talents Focus is "We Are All Co-Ministers." Church is a verb, and that means everyone who does church with Abiding Peace has the chance to be a minister. That doesn't mean you have to stand up front in a white robe or give the sermon on Sunday (although if you are interested in either of those things, talk to me. It can be arranged). God has given us all unique gifts, and they are all

First Quarter 2019 Financial Report

As has been requested by the congregation, the Council is committed to providing regular financial updates as we move into a new chapter in our ministry at Abiding Peace.

Please note in the numbers below that after the first quarter of this year we have a total shortfall of nearly \$3,000. This is a concern, especially because our spending is only about \$250 more than our budget, so most of the problem is on the giving side. If this is not addressed it could impact our ministry here at Abiding Peace. We trust that, as in the past, we will be enabled by God's grace to meet this challenge!

Naaman and the Servant Girl

One of my favorite books when I was little was called "Naaman and the Servant Girl." I don't remember who gave it to me but it was a hardcover, 4x6" book beautifully illustrated throughout. I treasured this book and have it somewhere in our 30 years of accumulations in our house.

Back in the days of Naaman, the Jews were separated from the Gentiles who were thought to be unclean. Even though that was the common feeling, the Bible gives us examples of Jews who regarded unbelievers in a different light. For example: Joseph, Daniel and the Servant Girl.

We don't know the Servant Girl's name. She was taken prisoner and was the servant of Naaman's wife. They had a good relationship so it was comfortable for her to make suggestions. She was loyal to her master. Naaman was highly esteemed by the king, a strong leader and respected. She felt compassion for Naaman and sorry that he had leprosy. She wanted him healed and she told his wife about the prophet Elisha (one who speaks for God) who would heal him.

So she told Naaman what the servant girl from Israel had told her and Naaman presented what he heard to the king and asked permission to travel to Elisha to be healed. When Naaman came to the King of Israel the king was furious and ripped his clothes saying how can they think he can heal this man. When Elisha heard of this he told the king to send Naaman to him, a prophet of Israel. Naaman went to Elisha who told him to dip himself 7times in the Jordan river and he would be healed. A servant helped Naaman believe in Elisha and he did as Elisha said and he was healed. Naaman was saved from alienation and judgment when he believed in God (vs. 15): "Now I know that there is no God in all the world except in Israel.

What did I learn from this story:

I learned that a little girl could bring a non-believer to God. It brought joy to Naaman, a non-believer. Therefore, if you believe and share your belief in God, you too can bring many others to know the love of God.—Nancy Ayotte

Spiritual Life Inventory – What did we learn?

At our Council retreat in April, your church leadership team had the chance to dive into the report from the Spiritual Life Inventory compiled by Luther Seminary as part of the *Leadership for Faithful Innovation* program we are participating in with the Synod. You may remember the survey because a good number of you filled it out last November. Well, we have the report from your responses and it offers some really interesting insights into the life of our church: where we are thriving, what we need, how involved we are, what feeds us spiritually, and where we can keep working to do better. The summary report is attached to this newsletter, and if you want the more detailed report just let Pastor Serena know and she can give you a copy.

The report offered so much food for thought that it's too much for one article. So, Council agreed that we will be providing the highlights of our analysis of the responses over the next several months. For the time being, here are the big-picture lessons:

- We are an engaged congregation. Whereas most of the congregations in the study were excited if they got 20-25% of their members to participate, we had more people complete the survey than we have at church on an average Sunday! And a large share of the respondents reported being engaged in some kind of ministry here. That is a great strength, and also means that there might not be a lot of bandwidth to "add" new things.
- We are diverse in our needs and experiences.

 Along with high engagement, our high participation in the survey means it gives a real overview of our congregation: from the super involved to folks who might not be getting as much from their church involvement; from those who are really growing in their faith to those who are stalled, or not even sure if they want to grow. There is depth and diversity in our congregation, even as small as we are, and our ministry needs to take these differences into account

There are two needs that especially stood out. While it's not the only thing we can learn from the survey, two themes suggest areas that can guide our efforts to grow in faithful innovation. The first is helping our members to *cultivate spiritual practices* – ways to bring the nourishment and strength of our faith into our daily lives. The second is learning how to tell the stories of our faith – letting faith be like the other good things in our lives that we actually talk about with other people. More on both of these themes in the coming months.



Which one of the following best describes your understanding of God's relationship to your daily life?




Which statement best describes how familiar you are with the Bible?




