Over the course of this Summer, members of Abiding Peace are meeting to discuss the newest social-statement-in-development by the ELCA churchwide body. The topic itself is important (Faith, Women, and Justice – it's not too late to join the last discussion after service on August 6!), but it is also important to understand *why* the ELCA has social statements in the first place.

In our first discussion session, we talked about what a social statement is and what it is not. A social statement is NOT law or doctrine. Individual members or congregations are not required to believe everything that is contained in these documents. They are not standards for Lutheran orthodoxy. The validity of our faith is not to be judged by our conformity to the ideals expressed in the statements. A social statement IS a guide for members to use in living out our faith in current circumstances. It is the result of detailed, prayerful study of relevant social issues by people who are deeply invested in the life of our church. It reflects the church's fullest understanding of scripture, supported by the information currently available about the topic. It is intended to be a resource to help us live lives consistent with our faith.

Our denomination invests in the careful development of social statements because social issues are often where our faith meets reality. Gathering with other believers to worship, and practicing spiritual disciples that deepen our relationship with God, are essential but not complete expressions of our faith. Our faith should also have an impact on how we live our lives in the world, and that includes how we respond to the pressing social issues of our time. With so many voices clamoring for our attention and telling us what is "right" and who is "wrong," our faith is our steady guidepost, and our church works hard to help us interpret the guidance of scripture for our time. That doesn't mean the social


Justice Gathering September 16
