At the beginning of May a small group of Abiding Peace folks gathered for an adult forum discussion. The topic was "The Millennial Mystery," and Heather Nilsen led us in a thoughtful and challenging discussion, using a Bible study resource from the December, 2017 edition of *Living Lutheran*. The education planning group had picked this study because Abiding Peace, like so many other churches, is grappling with the question "why don't we have more young people?" We ask this question not in accusation, but in the genuine desire to figure out how we can reach the needs of the younger generation, whom we recognize as an important part of the world God calls us to serve.

In our conversation on May 5, and some follow-up afterwards, at least one answer became clear: *church has to give young adults a reason to connect!* With so many demands on time, irregular work hours, and competing priorities – and without the same cultural expectation to "go to church" as older generations – Millennials are only going to show up for something that really matters in their lives.

But what does that mean? What makes church "matter?" It means **getting back to the heart of what church is really about.** As explained in the *Living Lutheran* study:

"(young adults) really aren't hungry for more church structure, or smooth programming, or better praise bands, or fun social activities – they are hungry for the radical Jesus they discover in the Bible. In this Jesus, they see a God who is real – present on the margins, willing to shake things up, on the side of the lowly, choosing to die without status, and always radically loving us and the world. The more congregations that proclaim this Jesus, the more the church will find opportunities to engage millennials."

I hope that was the work of God's change-making Spirit in our lives that didn't stop once we took the purple cloth off the altar. The question of the Millennial mystery challenges us to answer with authenticity in our identity and in our proclamation. And I find in that a deep reason for hope.

When it comes to the "big three" of Christian stewardship – time, talents, and treasure – time is probably the one that I struggle with the most. It's not so much that it's hard to share my time. (Howard is consistently on my case about making sure I am keeping my church hours reasonable). I love the work of the church. I *like* to spend my time prepping sermons and Bible studies, talking with church members about the challenges in their lives and questions in their faith, and planning meaningful worship and relevant outreach. It's not hard to give my time to the church – that's probably why this is my job!

The challenge is with the idea of "stewardship." Stewardship implies a sense of intentionality – a deliberate effort to assess what my resources are, and what needs there are, and then making wise judgements about how to use my resources – my limited time – most responsibly and faithfully. But there are a thousand demands on my time and attention every day, and I'm not necessarily thinking about stewardship when I respond. In today's frantic, go-go-go culture I know I'm not alone. We all get pulled in multiple directions and feel like we don't have enough time to give to any of the things we care about.

That's why I appreciate that the church names time as an area of stewardship. It's a reminder, or even an invitation, to be deliberate about the decisions I make regarding my time. My time is one of the resources God has given me, and being a good steward means being thoughtful about how I give it away. Sometimes that means giving it to the church. Other times to my family, or to making healthy food, or to a chat with a dear friend. There's lots of good things to give my time to, and instead of worrying about all the things I "don't have time for" I can focus on being a steward of the time I do have

# Spiritual Life Inventory, Part 2 Telling the Stories of our Faith

Last month's newsletter included an introductory article on the results of the Spiritual Life Inventory that our congregation completed last Fall. (If you missed it, you can go back and read it <a href="here">here</a> some encouraging and important findings). This survey is one of the tools we have access to through the Leadership for Faithful Innovation program. It offers us insights into how we are doing at meeting the needs of our faith community and nurturing the kind of growth and ministry that the gospel of Jesus Christ calls us into. The idea is not to give us a grade, but to lead us in discerning what we can try to change in order to more fully live into our mission.

One of the areas for growth revealed in the survey relates to *learning how to tell the stories of our faith*. Our congregation reported a very high level of spiritual connection (100% of respondents said they come to Abiding Peace to connect with God), but we also reported that we don't talk about that connection very much. Less than 20% reported talking to others about faith, or sharing stories of what God is doing in our lives on a regular basis.

Of course, there can be many reasons for the difficulty in talking about our faith. We live in a culturally and religiously diverse area, and there are lots of contexts (like work) where there are rules and expectations that limit what we are allowed to say about our faith. Even without restrictions, we rightly want to be respectful of others' beliefs and not be pushy. But talking about our own experiences isn't pushy. It's relationship-building. It's the willingness to be a little vulnerable and share about something that makes a difference in our lives. Of course, that means we have to be conscious of the difference God makes in our lives. And, according to the survey, about half of the congregation either didn't know if God was active in their daily lives, or felt God was present, but not particularly active.

Those responses are what reveal that *telling the sto- ries of our faith* as an area for growth in our congregation. How can we become more conscious of the ways that God makes a difference in our lives? How can we become attuned to the stories that we already have to share about the transformation, peace, joy, etc. that God works in our lives? How can we start to tell ourselves these stories first, so that – when the opportunity arises – we can tell them to others as well?

At least one of the answers to those questions is that our congregation can start to work on fostering spiritual practices that will help us connect to God's presence and activity in our lives. That's next month's article...


### **Get Ready for the Summer Book Club!**

Summer is coming, and that means we will be hosting our second annual **Summer Book Club**. This year, the education planning committee selected *Can I Get A Witness?* by Brian Blount. The book is a carefully researched – but also readable – exploration of the book of Revelation, which unpacks this often mis-understood book by recognizing the importance of context, both the original author's and our own, and be revealing (*see what I did there?*) the way that the Christian call to witness is an ethic for response to struggle and suffering.

### Why this book? Good Question:

- Revelation can be one of the most intimidating and confusing books in the Bible – this study will help us to understand and connect to it in a new way!
- Reading the Bible through a certain culture, especially if it's not our own, helps us to understand the role that we play in interpretation.
- This book offers us the chance to find the relevance of Revelation in our own lives.
