about being "prepared for ministry in light of God's mission for the sake of the world." The final part of that sentence clearly points us out into the world we are called to serve, and "outreach" is the way the church usually talks about that work.

But "outreach" can also be code for "how do we get new people to come to church?" To be clear, I believe it's a good thing when new people come through the doors of our church and find spir-

to come to church?" To be clear, I believe it's a good thing when new people come through the doors of our church and find spiritual nourishment and community here. The ministry, growth, and learning that happens at Abiding Peace is wonderful, and blessed by God, and there is a lot of need in the world for the things that happen here. But wanting people to come here for all of these good gifts is a different thing than understanding our mission as being "for the sake of the world."

Doing ministry "for the sake of the world" requires a shift of perspective that locates our goals outside of the institutional life of the church. Abiding Peace is a blessed and beloved community, but it's purpose for existence can't be turned in on itself. We need to always be looking out: looking to understand the needs outside our doors, and looking to see how God has called and equipped us to respond to those needs, whether or not the folks outside ever come in. During Lent we were reminded that the way God loved the world was to *send* Jesus in a way that both exposed our need for God and met that need to love and grace. As we enter into the Easter promise of resurrection this month, it is my hope that we can be open to the ways God might want to send us – to recognize the needs of the world, and meet them where there are with love and grace.

Holy Week Journey

Why would you want to go to church 4 days in a row?!

I know. It sounds like a lot. You have a life, and family, and Easter dinner to prepare, and Nor-Easters to clean up from, and all the rest. But I want to encourage you to think about participating in the full experience of Holy Week this year. The services for Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil are really designed as ONE integrated service stretched over three days. These three days and Easter are the center of our church year. They draw us into the movement from death to life that is the center of our faith and hope. Each night takes us another step on the journey, and gives us the time to reflect and learn in new and engaging ways.

Jesus will rise on Easter morning regardless, but I hope you will consider participating in the full journey. It is a sacred walk.

A WARM Celebration

We did it! We pulled together, and dug deep, and we paid for the new boiler that will keep our church home warm for many years to come.

It seemed like a huge hurdle when we learned the cost last summer: \$13,500! That's about 10% of our total annual budget! We had \$6,000 in emergency funds that we were able to use, but that still meant we needed to raise \$7,500 of new money from our small but mighty congregation. And Council is very proud to report that as of March 11 we have raised every dollar!

It is an encouraging sign for the financial health of this congregation. We know we are still facing some significant hurdles with our budget. Costs will be going up this year as Vicar Serena's internship ends (and hopefully transitions to a regular call), and we know repairs to the church roof and air conditioner are looming. But this milestone with the boiler, and the positive growth in pledging are reason to be encouraged. As a congregation, we are invested in doing the important work that God is calling us to do in Budd Lake. That's something worth celebrating!



Assistants Needed

Adding an additional communion assistant has helped the serving of Holy Communion run smoothly but it also means that another person is required. Please consider volunteering for this simple duty. There is no formal reading required. The communion assistant simply helps serve the wine, either with the pouring chalice or common cup. The only speaking required is the simple message "The blood of Christ shed for you".

Update on Abiding Peace's Therapy Dog

First, a very big THANK YOU to Alexis Sweeney for taking us to the Mendham Library and handling Rusty. GREAT JOB!!!! Rusty is a very gentle dog, but not quite gentle enough for my shoulder or arm at this time

Alexis is a NATURAL therapy pet handler. This was a first time experience for us all.

Rusty has never worked in a group setting with other dogs before. Unfortunately, Rusty didn't realize at first, that you're suppose to be quiet in a library. After Rusty announced his presence, he settled down.

Alexis escorted Rusty into the library and set up a comfortable place for us to work. She made the children comfortable as well and took good care of me.

You may be wondering why we would bring a dog to the library of all places. The library offers a wealth of opportunities for both children and animals. Children who have a fear of animals often overcome it. Many children don't have pets, so this time with an animal allows them to feel the affection and comfort of animals. The actual purpose of this service is to help children with their reading issues. Animals won't make fun of them, if the child makes a mistake. Shy children relax when reading to an animal. The child may struggle with reading, or be too shy to read out loud or in front of anyone or other fears. Past experience with Duchess (rabbit) and Anie (Cairn Terrier) have proven how this reading program improves the child's confidence and enhances their reading ability.

The experience is rewarding to everyone, (two legged or four legged) in so many ways.
