Advent Transformation

The church year begins with just one candle shining in the darkness. With a gentle chorus singing "come, o come...". With an invitation to waiting, to expectation... because something important is happening.

While the world around us is rushing into Christmas with all its activity, and noise, and vibrant light, Advent calls us to take a breath and remember that the really important changes don't happen in an instant. They unfold. They grow... like the light on the Advent wreath that gets a bit brighter each week. Advent invites us to pay attention to the process of transformation.

This fall, our adult forum class slowed down to explore the way in which the structure of our worship calls us into transformation. At the final session of our fall series on the liturgy, we considered this repeated pattern of transformation:

- We come to worship as individuals, weighed down by the world, conscious or unconscious of the sin that has marred our lives during the week... and in the *gathering* we are welcomed together into a holy place in which forgiveness is pronounced.
- We come to the readings distracted, perhaps overwhelmed by our own stories, or confused about what we are to do... and in the word we hear guidance and inspiration, a reminder that our story is part of something much bigger into which we are called.
- We come to the table hungry for a nourishment that goes deeper than bread... and in the *meal* we are sated with the Bread of Life, given for us.

 And finally, we conclude our worship having received forgiveness, belonging, inspiration, direction, the very body of Christ... and in the sending we are called back out into the world to give to others.

We follow this pattern of transformation every Sunday, but the season of Advent calls us to pay special attention to why our practice of transformation matters. Advent reminds us that we are in the middle of a much bigger transformation. The transformation of God's kingdom – God's way of doing things – invading our world and turning all of our broken patterns inside out.

It's not always a "merry and bright" process.

Transformation can be messy, and even scary at times. But, just like our pattern of worship, the change is one that we and our world need. Advent invites us in, meets our needs, and then sends us back out to be agents of transformation.

This season we will be exploring the theme of *witness* – which is just a churchy word for telling our story. Each of us has a story (probably more than one) of transformation. This Advent, let's embrace together the witness of transformation.

Why Do We Pledge?

When I hear the word "pledge" I generally think of fundraising: stewardship programs at church, or pledge drives for public radio or my favorite podcasts. In other words, I think of necessary, practical matters, that are not terribly inspiring, and might even be an unwelcome distraction from the reason I really came (or tuned in to listen).

When I asked my children what a pledge was, though, they gave a much more fundamental answer. They said: "a pledge is a promise." And, of course, they are right. That's exactly what a pledge is. And that means that *a pledge involves a relationship, not just a transaction*. When we make a promise, we are making a commitment that we are going to be around to keep that promise. This is a relationship that we see continuing into the future. And we want the other party in the relationship to know that we are there for this relationship going forward.

In that sense, *pledging can be considered a spiritual practice:* a commitment to a pattern of behavior – in this case a pattern of giving – that we pursue because we know it will grow our faith. We've been talking about "giving - a means to grow our faith" since mid-October. The stewardship focus is now complete, and this is probably the last time you will be hearing that phrase for a while. But our pledges, our promises will carry that growth forward as a continuing spiritual practice. They'll do the necessary, practical work too - of helping Council to plan the budget, and getting the bills paid – and I'm grateful for that! But I hope they are also inspiring. I hope they remind you, month-in-and-month-out that your promise connects you to a relationship that is vital, and meaningful, and a blessing to you as much as it is to all who are served by this church.

Thank you for pledging to support the work God is doing through Abiding Peace.

Temple Talk

The day I came here in 2016 happened to be world hunger day, so its funny I was asked to speak today 2 years later.

When I had first arrived at Abiding Peace I had gone through a lot of changes in my life: divorce, cancer, and sold my home, all in just over a year.

It was a very sad time for me as I felt alone and I had no purpose in life. My cancer had ended my long infertility battle and made me accept the fact I would never start the family I wanted, my marriage was over after 15 years, and I was just lost.

I asked myself what am I missing in my life and how could I turn this around...The answer was God. I had been away from my church and faith for a long time since moving from my home town many years earlier.

So I decided to go "church shopping." Abiding Peace was my 1st and last stop. Everyone was so welcoming and warm, without being pushy.

That 1st day I came here I heard about starving people all over the world, children right here in NJ with no school lunch and who were going to bed hungry. Then I heard what we could do to help. Everyone pitched in to write letters and was so engaged. As I spent the afternoon here I learned more about what this congregation does for the community and outreach...I said to myself, these folks are wholeheartedly generous and caring.

It made me realize that life is not about what I lost or don't have but rather how I can help others and serve the Lord. That day I walked in here with despair but left with a renewed hope and feeling whole again. I found my purpose and realized I do have a lot to offer. Also, that this is the place I want to be and the people I wanted to do it with.

I don't think any of you will understand what you gave me that day, but I am so truly grateful to all of you and happy to serve the Lord with you.

Temple Talk

I am an authentic baby boomer. I was born a year after WWII ended. I was baptized by my grandfather. My parents made sure my brothers and I went to church and Sunday School.

I loved Sunday School. There was a teacher who played piano with lots of pep and energy. We were encouraged to pick hymns and songs during our assembly time. Without question, our favorite hymn was a spiritual, "gonna lay down my sword and shield down by the riverside. Ain't gonna study war no more, no more." We requested that song time after time. We sang the wheels off that song. I can still remember the page number...232.

There was another teacher who had a flair for the dramatic. She used a really large flannel board with lights to teach us Bible stories. She moved scenery and figures around to make events come alive. There is one story I can still remember to this day. It was a story about two lakes located in the Holy Land. Of course, we know that in the Bible a lake is called a sea. The Sea of Galilee for example. Our teacher put up a blue roundish shape on the flannel board. That was the Sea of Galilee. Above that shape she put a narrow blue ribbon. That was the Jordan River flowing into the Sea of Galilee from the north. She explained that there were fish thriving in this sea, there was green vegetation along its banks, children played by the shoreline.

Then she placed another narrow blue ribbon on the southern edge of the Sea of Galilee. That was a continuation of the River Jordan. It flowed quite a ways south to another sea which was not blue but a grayish color. There were no fish in this sea, no greenery, no children playing nearby. This sea had an appropriate name...the Dead Sea. Our teacher explained that the difference between the two seas was that the Sea of Galilee receives but does not keep the fresh water of the Jordan. It receives and gives in equal measure. Whereas the Dead Sea receives and keeps every drop of water from the Jordan. It gives nothing. The lesson was clear...*to give is to live*.

When I was growing up, I received many blessings and didn't even know it. In my young mind I thought I was like most people, and most people were like me. I thought everyone lived in a house with a backyard to play in. I thought everyone had three meals a day. I assumed everyone had a change of clothes. I thought everyone had a safe and loving family life. I thought everyone went to church and Sunday School. When I became older, I realized my childhood assumptions were quite wrong. There was plenty of hurt and need in the real world. I knew I had to give. *To give is to live*. I didn't want to be like the Dead Sea.

At this time of year, when we have a stewardship emphasis, it is good to consider all the things we receive inside the walls of this church. For starters, we receive Word and Sacrament, supported by music and sacred dance. We have fellowship, we have an authentic, full-fledged pastor. What do we give outside of these walls? We have a food pantry, we participate in Faith Kitchen in Dover, we give food from our church garden, we have food baskets forming to be distributed to those in need in the community. *To give is to live*. It is good to give thanks for what we receive, and to ask God to bless our efforts and find new ways to give in a world of increasing need.
